



Three simple steps to remembering the Legion

To save you time, before visiting your Solicitor:

1. Make a note of all your assets, including any savings and investments.
2. Decide who you would like to provide for in your Will – your family, friends and favourite charities. If you would like to leave a donation to The Royal British Legion, your solicitor will need our full address: 48 Pall Mall, London, SW1Y 5JY and our Registered Charity Number: 219279.
3. Choose at least two executors (they can be friends, relatives or professionals) who will ultimately make sure that your wishes are carried out. It is a good idea to check that the people you have chosen are happy to take on the responsibility. On a practical note, it is usually advisable to select at least one executor who is younger than you.

Completing these three steps will prepare you for the questions your solicitor will ask and make the process of drafting your Will relatively straightforward.

The kinds of donation you can leave in your Will

A cash sum – it is worth asking your solicitor to index-link your donation to ensure the amount you leave keeps its value relative to inflation.

Specific gifts – these are gifts of named items such as shares, jewellery or furniture.

Residue – this is the remainder of your estate after your debts and expenses have been cleared and any cash sums or specific gifts have been paid. You can nominate people and organisations to receive a share or all of the residue. Leaving a percentage of your estate in this way will also help to reduce the effect of inflation.
